

## MULTISYSTEMIC THERAPY FOR CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT (MST-CAN)

Multisystemic Therapy for Child Abuse and Neglect (MST-CAN) is an evidence-based treatment programme designed to treat youth aged 6 to 17 and their families who have come to the attention of Child Protective Services due to physical abuse and/or neglect.

The MST-CAN works with the entire family in an effort to keep children with their families and help the family resolve clinical and practical concerns, enabling the children to feel safe. The programme has been developed by Professor Cynthia Swenson, South Carolina University. In relevance to current community needs this evidence-based treatment programme could be of interest.
